Reminiscing

A Recollection from Ray Pulis, May 2010

PAVING THE WAY: The Paving of Rte. 191 from Dyberry to Equinunk

The original plan was for the road (*then known as Route 90-Ed.*) to go from Dyberry to Tanners Falls, to Pine Mill, and then to Equinunk. Gifford Pinchot* was governor of Pennsylvania at the time, (the governor who got the farmers out of the mud. *Ed. note: But that's another story.*)

The Pinchot family went on a Caribbean Cruise and took home movies of the trip. I remember Cornelia Pinchot, (Gifford's wife, the former Cornelia Bryce,) sitting on a bench on the ship and a huge sea turtle crawled up on the bench and across her lap. I must have been about three years old at the time.

The Hill family got Mrs. Pinchot to come to the Methodist Church in Lookout to show the movies while the frost was going out in the spring. She had to be pulled through soft spots several times. There was a soft spot in the road near our house that dad pulled numerous people through with his horses. I think he must have pulled her out and that's how he found out about the movie show. The plans for the road paving were changed. (Mrs. Pinchot, like Hillary Clinton, wore the pants in the family.)

The first section of Route 191, (Route 90,) to be paved was from Dyberry and I was the General Foreman. The contractor was Lasiter from South Carolina. He also paved a section of Route 402 that year. The roller operator rolled all night on the fill by our house and then came in and had breakfast with us.

While Pinchot was governor there was a grove on the Pinchot family's property in Milford, with numerous picnic tables. Every year the governor would throw a picnic; after the picnic he allowed a tour of Greytowers, the family home, and a program was held on the lawn. The year I was there, a man and a kangaroo were boxing.

The day before the picnic, a section of road between Hawley and Milford was chipped and tarred; lots of tar and a few chips. At that time a lot of car owners wore tires down until they blew. Dad was one of these, and we had two flat tires that day. Folks with good tires had no problems. I heard that the man responsible for the tar and chipping job lost *his* job.

Ray Pulis

*Gifford Pinchot was the first Chief of the U.S. Forest Service. He served in that capacity from 1905 to 1910. The following is excerpted from the US Forest Service History Website:

"Gifford Pinchot, was born on August 11, 1865, in Simsbury, Connecticut. His family were well-to-do upper-class merchants, politicians, and land owners. Pinchot, as a young boy, took advantage of several opportunities to visit foreign countries, as well as gain a good education at some of the best eastern schools. When he entered Yale in 1885, his father asked a question, "How would you like to be a forester?" When asked, not a single American had made forestry a profession. Pinchot stated, "I had no more conception of what it meant to be a forester than the man in the moon....But at least a forester worked in the woods and with the woods - and I loved the woods and everything about them....My Father's suggestion settled the question in favor of forestry."
