Dedication Continues

Excerpts: Gayle Warner's remarks:

"My name is Gayle Warner. I'm one of the three original incorporators of the Equinunk Historical Society, along with Bob Wood and Bob Kramer. As we gather to celebrate the latest accomplishment of the Equinunk Historical Society, I'd like to take time to reflect on why this society has been so successful."

Gayle noted that 30 years ago the area was in turmoil because of the arrival of the National Park Service. Controversy arose between people born in the area and those newly arrived. Both groups wanted to preserve the unique atmosphere of Equinunk and its beautiful houses [but their approaches may have differed.] Bob Wood and Gayle decided to invite both groups to get together and discuss the history of the area. She went on to observe that Bob and Kathy Wood have devoted 'countless hours' and many resources to community action in their church and this society.

"Our success was based on respect for every person, native or newcomer". Anyone interested in history, antiques, fixing up an old barn, preserving architecture, finding Indian artifacts, learning self-sufficiency, and reading and writing history books was welcome. It didn't matter if one was 97 or 7, a history-related activity was developed, with appeal for all people.

She talked about finding and preserving the dugout canoe, and how she, her husband Russ, and Bob Wood moved the very water-logged item back to the Museum. The method of conserving it at that time was to "shoot it full of Elmer's glue." Gayle recited a litany of fun activities including homemade raft races on the Delaware, building a small log cabin, parades, raffles, and the popular ice cream socials.

"The Equinunk Historical Society has grown well through the years, changing according to the vision and hard work of those who were willing to put in the long hours that were necessary."

"I'd like to thank all of you who contributed your time and ideas: the Board of Directors, the society members, the employees, the volunteers, and most especially Carol MacMaster, without whose dedication, perseverance and hard work, the building of this new addition to the Museum could not have been accomplished." She also included Bob Kramer, saying that he has provided the financial guidance that made success possible.

Excerpts: Bob Kramer's Remarks

Bob congratulated the Society for accomplishing a long-time goal in building the addition. He thanked the many individuals who contributed to the project's funding, and expressed gratitude to the estates of Thomas Seccia and Floyd Schnakenberg. The families of both major donors were in the audience to help celebrate.

Bob commented that perhaps Thomas read the EHS publication on planned giving opportunities compiled in 1999 by Marilyn Kneeland, and observed that perhaps it's time to reprint the publication incorporating new tax changes, and encouraging future donors.

Bob offered a comparison in funding between the purchase of the Equinunk Manor House and funding for the new addition. Owner Christine Hessberger offered to sell the house for \$17,500 in May, 1983. A request for financial support was issued by the early directors of the Society; Bob Wood, Pat Christian, Eleanor Keesler, Wellington Lester, Audrey Price, Ruth Price, Gayle Warner, Kathy Wood, and himself. The effort raised \$7,500.00. A private loan was made to the group in the amount of \$10,000 in June. A letter went out to membership and friends requesting donations to help eliminate the mortgage in July. \$8,644.00 was raised by August of that same year. The mortgage was paid in full in about five years. Early furniture consisted of a folding table and a few chairs. By contrast, approximately \$300,000 was designated for the cost of the addition from the Seccia and Schnakenberg bequests. This included expenditures for the legally required elevator.

Bob closed his remarks by recognizing and thanking past members of the Board of Directors. He reminded everyone that Pat Christian who passed away in recent years, contributed a great deal of time and financial support to EHS.

Ed. Note: Pat and Eleanor Keesler co-authored several volumes of the history of northern Wayne County. The books, currently available in the Museum, are entertaining and valuable reading..



Looking Ahead




The Sawmill Comes to Life Again

The opening weekend for the Joel Hill Sawmill was a great success. More than 100 people enjoyed the tour and the sawing demonstration on July 10th and 11th. A lot has been accomplished at the mill this spring. The stone wall on the lower level was removed and rebuilt in preparation for a viewing deck. The stanchion on the lumber track was finished, and the wood treated to preserve it from the effects of the weather. The group stacked the cut lumber to allow it to air dry and performed everyday maintenance to keep the mill running smoothly. Chuck Heyn and the whole mill crew have done a lot of hard work and are a great group to work with. The Mill will be open again on August 13th and 14th. We added the extra Sunday last year and it proved to be so popular, we scheduled it again for this season.

A Friend Passes

Joseph (Joe) Funke of Lake Como, husband of popular former Wayne Independent columnist Rose Funke, died on July 22nd. He was a retired NASA engineer who worked on the Apollo Program. Joe, with his wife Rose, was an active member of the Equinunk Historical Society.

They were the proud owners of a very large, strikingly beautiful pianoforte which Rose purchased in 1942. In a story in *The Wayne Independent*, she called it her “first independent purchase” though she later learned that her parents contributed toward the purchase unbeknownst to her. Several years ago, the couple donated the 161-year-old instrument to EHS where it resides in the old parlor of the Calder House Museum and is, most likely, the first item one notices upon entering the Museum. In the article Rose said of the much-loved instrument, “I was thinking to give it to the Smithsonian Institute” but she decided that it should reside in a more accessible location. A history-rich piece, it pre-dates the Civil War.

Historian **Eleanor Keesler** has made a quite extraordinary recovery from recent hip surgery. She was back to work at the sewer authority in Manchester a couple of weeks after her operation. Eleanor continues to amaze everyone with her remarkable recuperative powers.
