

## Hangin' with Ed Simpson

Please let us introduce you to a wonderful artist in our midst. Ed Simpson, (Eddie to his friends,) We will have the pleasure of featuring Ed's art work on the walls of our gathering space at the Caldor Museum throughout the winter and spring months. When you come to hear the music at First Fridays, please take a few minutes to view his work.

Eddie was born one of ten children, on November 14, 1928 in Montreal, Canada. He met his future wife, Phyllis, while they were teens working in a textile factory. They married in Canada in 1951.

In 1953, with \$700 in their pockets and high hopes, they left Canada and came to Long Island, NY. Eddie worked there for the Iron Art Company until it went bankrupt, and then went into business with a friend, making wrought iron decorative spiral staircases and railings. That business began down in Eddie's basement. He and Phyllis moved five times and had three sons, Eddie Jr, Wayne, and Bruce, during their time on Long Island. So it was a busy time, but Eddie managed to find time to make paintings in the evenings. Eddie credits Bill Alexander and Bob Ross for inspiring him to paint through their television programs. But that was just the beginning.

Since he first put paint to canvas back on Long Island, Eddie has enjoyed making a wide range of American landscapes and seascapes in all seasons. He likes to feature old barns, farm houses and lighthouses in his scenes. Eddie works in oils and acrylics and even

makes his own frames from scrap lumber he finds. His work ranges from small pieces to "sofa-size" and "wall-size" murals. And he is not limited to canvas. Nowadays, Eddie scouts garage sales for old saws, takes them apart, refurbishes the handles, paints natural scenes on the blades, and then reassembles them. They are beautiful!

But Eddie's interests and skills extend well beyond iron work and painting. In 1970, he bought land in Equinunk and began the work of making it a home. He built his house, a two-story workshop, a playhouse for his kids, porch swings, picnic tables, you name it. And he has built more than one gazebo for family and friends over the years. Anyone stopping by his place can see at a glance that he is also a gardener. Nothing is ever wasted and he usually sprouts his flowers and trees from seeds he collects. Eddie enjoys our wildlife and they like him. Chipmunks and chickadees eat right from his hand! Photography is another attraction for Eddie. He has cabinets full of pictures he takes of the things he loves: family, friends, animals and the natural world.

Eddie's spirit of adventure took him many places before he settled in Equinunk. Prior to marrying Phyllis, he 'rode the rails' as a hobo with friends. He remembers to this day how many people traveled that way, men *and* women, and he saw how dangerous and exciting that was. He tells about one job in particular at the Calvary Stampede rodeo where he and a friend cared for the horses. With a grin, Eddie says, "We were pilots," long pause, "We shoveled one pile from here to there."

In 1988, Eddie and Phyllis moved here permanently. After she became sick with Alzheimer's Disease, he retired to stay home and care for her. Since Phyllis died, Eddie has divided his time between Equinunk and Florida. Naturally, he has studios in both places. When I asked him why he keeps painting, he answered that he just wants to keep getting better. We are fortunate to have this wonderful artist and neighbor, Eddie Simpson, right here and just as he is.

## *The Passing of Friends*

**Ed Dix** passed away on his 94<sup>th</sup> birthday at Bethany village on August 5, 2015. He was a favorite here at EHS, and visited often, always volunteering to help anytime we needed him. He once wrote his name and phone number on a piece of paper and stuck it on the office computer tower so we wouldn't forget.

He and his wife, Dorothy, who preceded him in death after 67 years of marriage, have always been active members. He was an active member of his community, serving for many years as the District Magistrate, Supervisor for Buckingham Township, SEO, volunteer fireman and first responder EMT out of the Northern Wayne Fire Company, was deputized by the Honesdale Sheriff's Department and served on the Lakewood Library Committee and as a Boy Scout Leader.

Ed was also predeceased by his eldest son, Edward I. Dix. He will be missed by his daughters Dawn Yonkin and husband Charles, Betsey Ambuter and husband Bruce, and son David of Starrucca, along with 17 grandchildren, 33 great-grandchildren, and 4 great-great-grandchildren. Along with many community members, we too will miss our old friend.

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**John "Doc" Hathaway** was a longtime EHS supporter. He passed away on September 10, 2015 with his family by his side in Sarasota, Florida.

"Doc" Hathaway was always very active in his community and throughout his life he encouraged others to do their best and was always looking for an opportunity to lighten another's burden and provide them a reason to smile.

We loved to hear his stories and especially loved his enthusiasm for all things baseball. He graduated from Hancock in 1950 where he was a standout baseball player. He also played on the community team and donated several mementos from that era including a ball and bat and photo of the team. He also coached many Little League and Pee Wee League youngsters throughout his years in Sidney, New York.

"Doc" was born in Pine Mill to Grace and Emmett Hathaway on August 6, 1930.

He is survived by his wife of 60 years, Dorothy, two sons and a daughter, and his sister Betty Wood.

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**Grace Schuman Kean** was 96 when she passed away, surrounded by her loving family. Born in 1920, she was the daughter of Leo and Lillian Rose Schuman. She had three daughters, Leona White, Leora DuMond, and Lois Young. She made her home with Lois and her son-in-law, Wally Young.

From her obituary notice: "Grace was a kind, loving lady who enjoyed being with her large family and many friends. An active member of the Equinunk United Methodist Church and the United Methodist Women, she greatly enjoyed the company of monthly luncheons with special friends." She was active in many community organizations, notably the Pine Mill Community Hall Assoc. Grace's son-in-law Wally was a longtime sponsor of the Equinunk Historical Society's Car Shows. Grace's smile will be greatly missed.

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In a stunning follow-on, **Leora Kean DuMond** of Honesdale, daughter of Grace Schuman Kean, passed away after a long illness just three days after her mother's death.

From her obituary: "She grew up attending the Equinunk United Methodist Church. She married Chauncey DuMond Jr. of Starlight in 1963. A military family, they moved six times in eleven years. Funeral services were co-celebrated with her mother, Grace Kean, at the Equinunk United Methodist Church. Our deepest sympathies go out to Lois and Wally Young and all of the family.

# Northern Pennsylvania Stonewall History

In a distinct departure from its usual programs, EHS presented an evening program on Friday, October 2 at 7 PM. to a standing-room only crowd. “Northern Pennsylvania Stonewall History: Tradition and Restoration”, was developed by Ken Ely of Good Neighbor Walls, who came to us through a grant from the Pennsylvania Humanities Council. Ely, who engages in the restoration and construction of dry-laid fieldstone walls, focused on the history and styles of stonewalls of our area. He conducts lectures and workshops on the subject. He is a member of The Stone Foundation (Santa Fe, NM) and a supporter of The Drystone Conservancy (Lexington, KY). Since 2000, Ely has been a participating artist in the Susquehanna County Artists’ Open House Studio Tour. He was a featured heritage craftsman from 2005 to 2009 at the Harford Fair (Harford, PA).

Ely’s presentation included a discussion of the geology of the region, the purposes and incentives for building the walls and a look at those who built them. Audience participation was enthusiastic, as it allowed the talk to be guided by the facets of stonewall building that most interested those present. Slides showed old walls in the region, fallen structures, recently built walls and walls in various stages of completion. A sampling of tools and equipment employed in stonewall construction, such as hammers, chisels, pry bars, measuring tapes and sticks, levels, knee pads, etc. were displayed as well. Comments that followed the presentation included, “Can he come back again next year?”

Walsh** – draft horse harness from late 1930's and early 1940's, belonging to Vernon Roney, former Preston Township Supervisor, and used to plow roads for the Township, one set of harness for driving cart, two full horse collars and one bridle. **Wayne Co. Library Alliance** – scale model of early Winterdale, Pa (Haides,) blackboard section and chairs from Winterdale one-room school, photos, framed items and genealogical information on Foster/For-ester and other families in the area.
